

Project Update | July 2026

The Province of B.C. acknowledges the Belleville Terminal Redevelopment Project is located on the traditional territory of the lək'wəŋən Peoples, who have lived on and cared for these lands, waters and natural resources since time immemorial.

Forming the Foundation

Crews continue to install piles and pour concrete to build the foundation for the new terminal. A waterproofing membrane is also applied to keep the base dry.

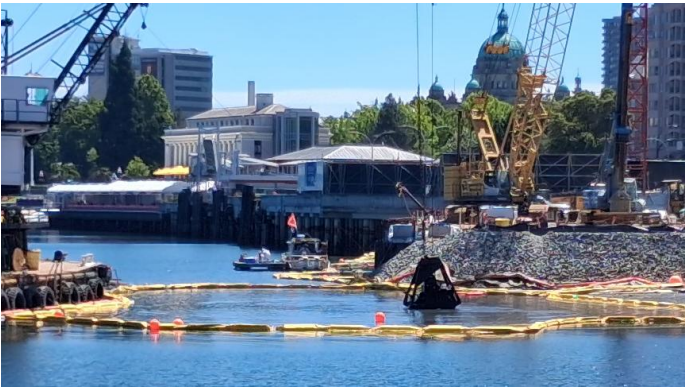

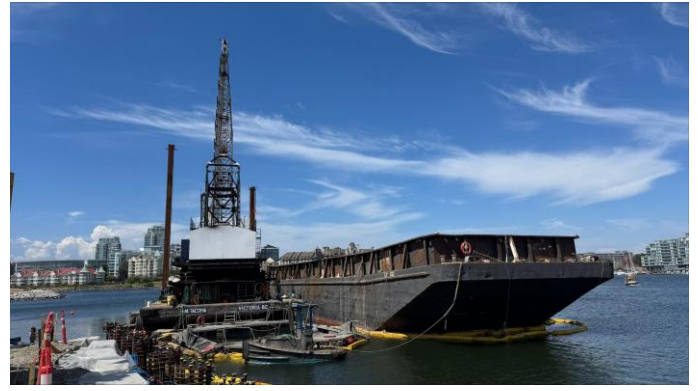
Preparing for Marine Piles

Dredging is a key activity before marine piling can begin. During this process, crews are removing historical contamination and debris where the new wharf structure will be built. The ocean floor is then covered with a layer of clean sand to further protect the marine environment.

Marine piling activities will soon be getting underway and involve delivery of equipment, rebar and concrete work, and installing piles.

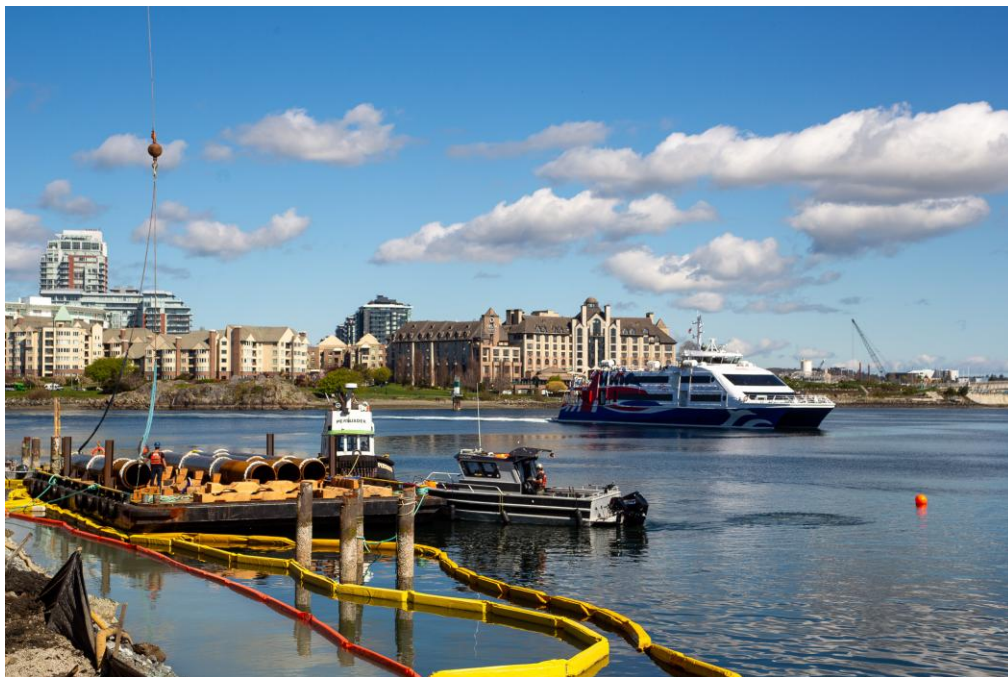


Flowers bloom in hanging baskets on lampposts. The tower crane can be seen in the background. Photo taken June 2026.

They are also collaborating on the design process to ensure the future terminal supports safe, efficient, and reliable service. The design for the terminal building is being finalized and will be shared in the coming months.

For several decades, Black Ball Ferry Line and FRS Clipper have served as key connections to the Greater Victoria region. In 2019, Black Ball Ferry Line celebrated the 60th anniversary of the M.V. Coho, and this year FRS Clipper celebrates their 40th anniversary. Congratulations on these milestones!
